CALLING FOR PROTECTION OF THE ELWHA WATERSHED

Dear Commissioner Franz,

We come together to ful ll our sacred responsibility to care for the natural world, united in our commitment to protect the Elwha Watershed and all our ancient and mature forests from the imminent threat of logging. We, as Indigenous Peoples, have known since time immemorial that these forests are not mere resources but relatives, elders, and teachers, offering wisdom and guidance. The Elwha Watershed is an interconnected web of life, a cultural and spiritual home, sustaining the Salmon, the Orcas, and all of us.

The pre-colonial landscape offered abundance, cultivated through our sacred relationship with the land, the water, and our non-human relatives. When settlers arrived, Western Red Cedar, central to our way of life, was logged from many river valleys. We are glad to see replanting efforts, but replanting cannot replace the existing complex forest ecosystems where these trees still thrive.

We welcomed DNR's decision to cancel the "Power Plant" timber sale in December 2023, and to protect 69 acres of critical forest along the Elwha River. We are now alarmed to learn of four planned timber sales in the Elwha Watershed ~ "Tree Well," "Parched," "Alley Cat," and "Bread and Butter" -- totaling 555 acres and currently slated for auction to timber companies by the end of this year. If these proposed sales are allowed to go through, we would lose nearly half the remaining mature, structurally complex forests in the Watershed. This logging, some of which is on steep slopes near the Elwha River and its major tributaries, disrespects a decade's worth of restoration efforts, threatening our Salmon and our way of life.

We do not understand a way of thinking that would spend hundreds of millions on Elwha River restoration but continue to industrially log in that same watershed. We do not understand a way of thinking that takes too much and says it is never enough; that would disrespect a River that gives us so much life and now hope.

Our ancestral knowledge and sacred obligation to the natural world teaches us a different path. We have inherent and treaty protected rights in these lands as our usual and accustomed gathering areas Together, we call for the protection of the Elwha Watershed as a commitment to our mutual future and to the wellbeing of all who depend upon it. We ask you to stop these planned timber sales and heed our call to be guided by principles of respect and reciprocity in caring for the watershed.
